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## Tails From the Rear

reparing for sea. Now that Port Captain Drew has declared the harbor is free of ice and Commodore Sugden has declared the yachting season open, it's time to prepare our crews for life at sea.

In the age of sail, captains played a crucial role in preparing sailors for life at sea. Here's how they typically did it:

Recruitment and Selection: Captains would often recruit sailors from ports or through agencies. They would select individuals based on their experience, skills, and physical fitness.

Training: Once aboard the ship, new sailors would undergo training to learn the ropes, literally. They would be taught how to handle sails, tie knots, steer the ship, and perform other essential tasks. This training was typically conducted by experienced crew members or boatswains. Did I mention Bowlines?

Familiarization with Ship: Captains would ensure that sailors were familiar with the layout and operation of the ship. This included knowing the location of important areas such as the galley, sleeping quarters, and emergency equipment (and where the rum is stored).

Navigation and Seamanship: Captains would teach sailors navigation skills such as reading charts, using navigational instruments,

and understanding tides and currents. Seamanship skills, such as handling rigging, anchoring, and navigating through different weather conditions, were also essential.

Teamwork and Communication: Sailors were taught the importance of teamwork and clear communication, as operating a sailing ship required coordinated efforts from the entire crew.

Health and Hygiene: Captains were responsible for maintaining the health and hygiene of the crew. Sailors would be instructed on practices to prevent illness and injury, such as proper sanitation, food preservation, and basic medical care.

So, it was then and most of this pertains today. Personally, I'm going to work on crew discipline!

BTW, thank you all who worked so hard on our beautiful Opening Day bash. Collectively we knocked it out of the park. And big thanks to all who came and celebrated. Bryan Drew was right. There was plenty of ice at the bar...



# A Lift to the Party! History of the VYC Elevator

or forty years, there was one way to get to the second floor of the Ventura Yacht Club – the stairway. When Paul Swanson was Commodore in 2004, there had already been talk amongst the membership about installing an elevator. Paul took the concept to heart, and through his persistent and optimistic promotion, the decision was made in 2006 to construct an elevator in our building. This represented a turning point in the club. Commodore Alex Blankfield wrote in the January 2006 Forecast, "We as a club are now dedicated to making it possible for everyone to have equal access to our upstairs dining room." That spirit of inclusion and commitment swept through the membership with many members stepping up to launch the project.

Two project planning groups were formed. Katie Johnston chaired the fundraising subcommittee, along with Judy Cunningham, Dotty Massa, and Irene Stanton. The second subcommittee, responsible for design and implementation, was headed by Paul Swanson and included Don Mills, David Potter and Avery Stuart.

By the end of 2006, most of the anticipated budget of \$125,000 was realized through contributions from over 90 VYC members. However, in



significantly increase the anticipated budget to finish the project. Club members overwhelmingly voted to continue supporting the elevator project with club reserve funds making up the difference. Over the next few months, Paul Swanson (project lead) provided ongoing jobsite coordination with numerous contractors, while Don Mills provided essential engineering expertise. By early 2008, the coordination team felt confident that the elevator could be operational before our April Opening Day.

Final costs for the elevator rose to almost \$200,000. Katie Johnston,

VYC Treasurer, spearheaded a critical funding push by organizing an auction to raise the necessary funds. Further, to cut costs, many generous and industrious VYC members completed the finish work details. Commodore Jeff Stansfield acknowledged the efforts of these VYC club members in the February and March 2008 *Forecasts*. Katie Johnston was surprised with flowers for her years as Treasurer and resourceful fundraising efforts. Paul and Sandy Swanson, Robin Matt, Don Mills, Gary Bright, Larry Works,

John Grether and Neil Frasier were recognized for picking up brushes and rollers to cheerfully apply 10 gallons of donated paint.

One of the outstanding elements of our elevator is the way contributors are recognized. Originally, a brass plaque was planned, but Sandy Swanson, a talented ceramicist, proposed the idea of hand painted tile, with images of the islands, the ocean, and sailboats owned by key contributors. Sandy painted, glazed and fired each tile, then Paul installed the tiles just days before the April dedication.

The elevator project was completed in time for the April 5, 2008, Opening Day. At the elevator dedication ceremony, Eula Robbins cut the ribbon, and Commodore Jeff Stansfield proposed this toast, "May this elevator go up and down for many years to come, and safely carry all those who need a lift to the party."







# Vagabond Sailor: Corsican Connection

eaving La
Spezia on the
Italian mainland
we were up early
for the 90-mile
jump to Corsica,
which would be
Adagio's first significant offshore

northwesterly. We made landfall at the town of Macinaggio on Cap Corse, the finger-like peninsula that constitutes the northern tip of Corsica.

Corsica is a fiercely independent province of France with a mostly Italian culture. An unruly stepchild, according to the mainland French. Maybe so. I had been duly advised (warned?) that when in Corsica, I should purchase and fly the Corsican flag above the French tricolor on my flag halyard. We complied. This is a good time to note that Corsican souvenir shops displayed a lot of evil looking knives that went well beyond the requirements of any domestic kitchen. Plus, we all on Adagio agreed that the Corsican flag (which features the silhouetted and bandanaed head of a Moorish version of Che Guevara) looked kind of cool in a Jolly Roger, pirate sort of way. And who among us does not want to be a pirate?

The Corsican coast was rugged, mountainous, and a lush green from the spring rains. On my folding bike I headed up into the rural interior on a narrow, steep, switch backed road. Resting on the steps of a nameless weathered stone church I had a sweeping vista of the town and harbor below and the cobalt blue, whitecapped

Tyrrhenian Sea. There was no life other than a lone hawk that circled below me, oblivious to my presence. The sensation of remote solitude amid great natural beauty was only magnified by having arrived at this anonymous location by sailboat and bicycle. No cruise ship, Trip Advisor or tour guide necessary.

### **Unmemorable Med Mooring**

Motoring down to Bastia, we had our first, and not last, awkward experience with Med mooring. We got in, but not without dinging the immaculate dark blue hull of our neighbor's 46-foot sloop. He was not aboard, but we left a 2-inch, white, and highly conspicuous scuff on the hull that would not rub out. The young dock attendant on the quay, who bore no blame for our miscue, suggested that we should probably report it to the marina office. I had no intention of being a hit-and-run Med moorer, although the

thought briefly crossed my mind. If so, I reasoned, we would have to dispose of this witness. This being Corsica, something like this could no doubt be easily arranged and probably happened all the time. I'm just thinking...

The first lesson in Med mooring is, "Thou shalt not ding, dent, or otherwise disfigure thy neighbor's fiberglass." And if done repeatedly, this will annoy your insurance company let alone annoying your neighbor, if the damaged boat was occupied, for the duration of your stay. *Adagio's* fiberglass I soon deemed aesthetically expendable and usually something that a guy in a marina could remedy for 50 Euros with some epoxy, a buffer, and a cold beer. The short-term solution for us on *Adagio* was to go very, very slow and have lots of fenders out plus a few in hand to cushion the inevitable bumps.

Fortunately, if there's one constant

about Med mooring, it is that when you approach your mooring, your dock neighbors will drop whatever they're doing, or even drinking, and jump to help you secure your vessel. To my undying personal gratitude, this would prove to be the norm throughout the Mediterranean and must be grounded in the mutually understood universal truth, "There but for the grace of God...."

Not until much later would I appreciate that Med mooring, like many other aspects of cruising, was a highly situational undertaking. It was not given to formalistic technique but rather more about mastering the feel of your boat – particularly in reverse. This would be done while monitoring wind speed and direction, boat speed and other traffic in the finger. My competence would come with time, much trial, and lots of error. And no stinking bow thruster!

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
